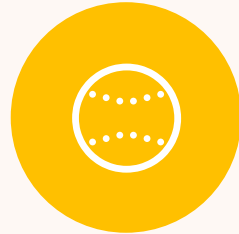

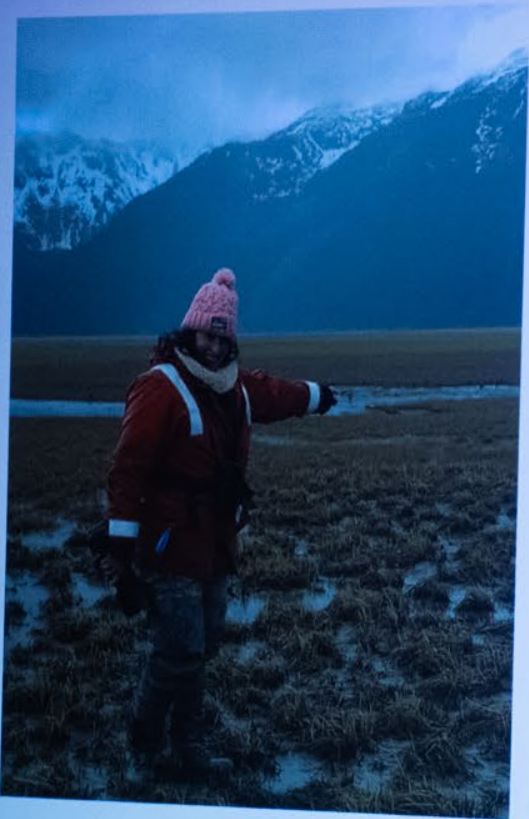

Goals

Conservation	Strengthen conservation of migratory birds through existing initiatives and plans such as NAWMP, USSCP, NAWCP, WBFI, Latin America-Caribbean Program-Ducks Unlimited Inc., and NABCI
Knowledge Base	Strengthen knowledge base for migratory bird conservation by initiating and facilitating priority research needs and assessments.
Partnerships	Build new and stronger partnerships for migratory bird conservation, including WHSRN, TNC, Latin American NGO's and governments.
Education	Increase public understanding and appreciation for migratory birds and their associated ecosystems. Foster public support and a sense of urgency for achieving conservation goals.
Funding	Leverage and increase funding for migratory bird conservation along the pacific coast.
